



Year R Curriculum Report – Spring Term A

The story that we are focusing on this half term is the Greatest Showman, following the interests of many children in the year group. The children will be invited to take part in a screening of the film before the topic starts, to hook them into the topic and introduce it as a new interest to those children who have not yet seen it.

Here is an outline of the key objectives we will be covering in each area of learning:

Personal, social and emotional development – The children will be encouraged to take steps to resolve conflicts with other children through finding a compromise. They will be supported to describe themselves in positive terms and talk about their abilities, and extended to praising their friends for their positive aspects as well. We will explore what makes us all different, and ways to celebrate this.

Physical Development – We will continue to focus on gross and fine motor movements, exploring ways that exercise can contribute to good health and using pencils to form recognisable letters, using the school script.

Communication and Language: In order to achieve the expected level for the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage in July, children need to be using tenses correctly when they speak. You can support your child with this by modelling talking in full sentences as much as possible and correcting errors they frequently make. We will explore recounting our experiences and telling stories to each other, with opportunities to act out stories that the children have told for an audience. Encourage your child to extend their language and recount skills by using words such as “and”, “then”, “next”, “before” or “later on” to expand their accounts.

Literacy: In literacy sessions, we will be continuing to develop the children’s phonic knowledge through daily group sessions. Some children are beginning to learn ‘digraphs’ (two letters that make one sound – e.g. ch, ee, or). Each sound has a rhyme to help children remember it. (They can be found on the school website – please look under the Parents Page tab.) We are also continuing to explore “tricky words” with a focus on “see”, “was”, “you” and “my” this half term. Keep an eye out for these words and ask your child if they recognise them! An important part of becoming a successful reader and writer is developing the confidence to use these skills independently. You can help your child with this by making sure there are books to read and writing resources available at home, as well as ensuring that you participate in the Reading Challenge as often as possible.

Mathematics – This half term we will be exploring addition and subtraction, introducing the concept using practical resources and beginning to look at a number line. We will also be exploring measurement, with a focus on weight and capacity. The children will explore estimation, so encouraging your child to guess how many items there are before counting will support them in this area. Please continue to support your child’s number recognition to 20, with a focus on ‘teen numbers in particular. We will also be exploring 2D and 3D shapes, focusing on their properties such as “sides”, “corners” for 2D shapes and “edges” and “vertices” for 3D.

Understanding of the world – We will focus on what is similar and different between us and our friends. Discussing what makes your child unique and celebrating this is a great way to introduce this. In Forest School, the children will continue to talk about the features of their own immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another. Children will also have the opportunity to complete a simple program on a computer.

Expressive Arts and Design – The children will be encouraged to select resources and work independently to shape, assemble and join materials. There will be many opportunities to play cooperatively as part of a group to develop and act out a narrative through a circus role play and a stage, as well as the home corner.

Home learning challenge:

This half term, our home learning challenges are:

1. Think of things that you are good at. Write a list, draw a picture or use the internet with an adult to find some pictures to represent your idea.
2. Choose someone who is special to you and think about a way to show them how important they are to you. You could take a photograph of your idea.
3. Learn to do up your zip, buttons or shoelaces if you can't already do them!
4. Create a film review of The Greatest Showman. This could be written, in pictures or a video.
