Phonics



Phonics

- Phonics is taught in six phases from Year R to Year
 2.
- The children work through the phases at their own pace, so may be at a different place to their friends and peers.
- Start with Phase 1 and work through until you find an activity that your child can't do independently.

Phase 4

- No new sounds are taught in Phase 4.
- Children use the sounds they have already learned to read words with adjacent consonants (such as sp, tr, fl etc.) and compound words.
- They learn the tricky words:
 - have, like, come, some, were, there, little, one, do, when, out, what



Phase 4: Vocab

- Adjacent consonants are two consonants any letter other than a, e, i, o, u – next to each other.
 This is not a digraph as there are two sounds.
- Compound words are words made up of two smaller words (such as playground, catnap etc).



Phase 4 Activities

- You can use all of the activities from Phase 2 and 3 here, but make sure that you are using words with adjacent consonants.
- Chopping compound words in half (literally or with your finger) is a fun way to read them. You can also do this in reverse and build them like a puzzle.
- Instructions: You can write instructions for your child to follow. This could be a treasure hunt, an outside challenge or even a recipe.
- Yes or no questions: Read the question and decide if the answer is yes or no. These could be sensible or silly questions!

Phase 4 Phoneme Frames

• Just like at Phase 2 and 3, you can use phoneme frame. Remember that one **sound** goes in each space, not one letter! You may need more than 3 spaces this time.
